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Leadership Roles at INIS

We are working to promote **Responsibility** with our children through a range of leadership opportunities within school. Here is some information about some of the roles working well at present. Most of these whole school opportunities are for our Year Two children, however each class has it's own daily leaders to do specific classroom tasks.

Active ambassadors

Our active ambassadors have recently been trained by Mrs Bailey and Mr O'Brien to share activities at playtimes with their friends and class mates to encourage active playtimes but also fun and socialisation. The Active Ambassadors will change every two to three weeks to give a range of children opportunity to lead through PE and sport.

Play Pals

Some of our Year Two children are chosen as leaders with our Reception children at lunch times. They help with meals, opening packets etc and encourage children to play together. The children agree to do this for a week at a time. The Reception children have really enjoyed having the older children to help and play with.



School Council

Classes have chosen two children from each KS1 class to be part of our School Council. The children meet regularly with Mrs Mason. They deal with real school issues and report back to the class council (whole class). They have been busy planning ideas for our Health and Well- being week and have shared ideas with our PTA.

Superstar Spotters

As part of our work on developing well behaved and responsible citizens we have been reviewing our behaviour and relationships policy. We are encouraging the children to recognise and make the right choices about their own behaviour. To help encourage this the Year two teachers have chosen 4 children this term to spot great behaviour in our assemblies. These will change on a regular basis.

Digital Leaders

Miss Garrett will be working with a group of Year two children to improve our digital knowledge and safety within school. The children will also be working **with IJS** to help consider an approach across the whole site. We are looking to plan activities for Internet safety Day in February with this group.

All Homework needs to be in school by <u>Friday 26th January</u>. New homework will also be given out on this day and will need to be returned by <u>23rd February</u>. This will hopefully give you time for school and family activities. If you have any concerns regarding the homework please see your child's class teacher. We hope that you and your child are enjoying the balance of activities since the changes were made at the beginning of term.



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Behaviour at INIS (Policy is on our website)

We take behaviour very seriously at INIS and to this end I am reminding parents about our Behaviour and Relationships policy, which has been recently updated **by governors and staff.**

We have five simple rules which we use with the whole school starting with Nursery.

The vast majority of our fantastic children are brilliantly behaved and quickly respond if behaviour needs to be corrected. We all need to be reminded about behaviour and how it affects others from time to time!

Our behaviour system in school is based around **Restorative Approaches**. This is an approach which has come from the justice system and works on ensuring that both the victim and the alleged offender have an opportunity to say what happened, how they are feeling, how they think other people are feeling and what needs to be done to repair the harm. This is not just a simple chat but a way of encouraging reflection on what has gone wrong and learning about how to improve the situation. We have always spoken with children about their behaviour, but this approach always provides support for any child who has been hurt. A long side this approach runs a series of consequences.

The Restorative approaches are based on four key areas:

- **RESPECT:** for everyone by listening to other opinions and learning to value them.
- **RESPONSIBILITY**: taking responsibility for your own actions.
- **REPAIR**: developing the skills within our school community so that its individual members have the necessary skills to identify solutions that repair harm and ensure behaviours are not repeated.
- **RE-INTEGRATION**: working through a structured, supportive process that aims to solve the problem and allows young people to remain in their classroom when they are calm and settled.

Restorative approaches encourage children to take responsibility for their own behaviour and relationships and teaches them how to manage conflict constructively. There will still be rewards and sanctions, but children will have more say in these. The hurt child may say that they want the other child, to use kind hands next time along with a simple consequence decided with the adult.

All the research indicates that this supports and improves children's behaviour as they learn to take responsibility for their own actions. We also involve parents when discussing individual children's behaviour, so you can also support at home. We believe having a consistent approach with home and school is very important.

"As a parent governor I was involved in reviewing the behaviour policy and felt that the new policy helps the children understand the consequences of behaviour. Feelings can be difficult to manage and this approach helps them develop and build strategies to manage their own behaviour in the future." Mrs Bryan
