Here are some stats:

The school was allocated 380 fobs and so far you have used 192 fobs, which works out at 50.53% of fobs in use. Total swipes for the fobs is 2714 and total points for the fobs is 13890.

The school was allocated 410 cards and so far you have used 118 cards

which works out at 28.78% of cards in use. Total swipes for the cards is 1799 and total points for the cards is 9820.

To increase your position on the leader boards a simple 10% increase in the usage of cards or fobs can go a long way. This can be as simple as some parents forgetting to register their cards - without them registering their cards their points won't be going to your team. **Well done and keep up all the hard work!**


#### <u>Thank you</u>

### School Developing vocabulary

Developing vocabulary is something we realise is vital for our children's learning. To this end, the teachers have had further training on encouraging the use of new and adventurous language. This will help our children to understand what they read, become better writers and to understand ideas in different subjects.

Here is some advice from the Reading Rockets website about how you can support at home. (<u>http://www.readingrockets.org/</u>)

When introducing new words to your young learner, keep the following four helpful hints in mind:

1. First, provide a simple, child-friendly definition for the new word: Enormous means that something is really, really big.

2. Second, provide a simple, child-friendly example that makes sense within their daily life: Remember that really big watermelon we got at the shop? That was an enormous watermelon!

3. Third, encourage your child to develop their own example: What enormous thing can you think of? Can you think of something really big that you saw today? That's right! The bulldozer near the park was enormous! Those tyres were huge.

4. Last, keep your new words active within your house. Over the next few days and weeks, take advantage of opportunities to use each new vocabulary word in conversation. Take the time to share new words and build your child's vocabulary. You'll be enormously glad you did!




A number of our children have access to the Reading Eggs and Maths Seeds programmes – these can be used at home and school and are beneficial in supporting your child to practice and make progress with key reading and maths skills.

All of our children eligible for the Pupil Premium scheme have had details sent home about how to access these online programmes, as well as many other children across school with additional needs or those needing some extra support with their learning. We pay a school subscription for Reading Eggs and Maths Seeds so it is really important that we are using them as much as possible – please speak to your child's teacher or contact Miss Chapman if you are unsure of your child's log in details or you think your child may benefit from using these programmes at home.

#### Learning adventures into a global curriculum in Iceland

In March, Mrs Hall travelled to Iceland with Miss Pettitt from Finedon Infant School



to learn about how the Icelandic system manages provision for pupils with Special Educational Needs. They were fortunate enough to be able to visit three different schools and meet pupils and staff working in a range of settings. They learnt that the system in place for SEND pupils is very similar to ours in the UK but bought back some new ideas to explore in our schools.

In Iceland, all children attend preschool at two years old and enter formal schooling at seven. The schools place a great emphasis on values and have six core values at the heart of every school's curriculum. These values are literacy, democracy and human rights, sustainability, equality, health and welfare and creativity.

Even the youngest of children were able to dress independently to play outside in the snow, wind and rain and were all prepared with snow suits, hats, gloves and wellies. Luckily Mrs Hall and Miss Pettitt had gone prepared for this weather too!

At school we use NSPCC materials from the Pants Campaign in conjunction with our Protective Behaviours programme. The materials are specifically designed to be used with children from the age of four. The messages are reassuring and practical, ensuring all children have the language they need to stay safe.
