

Irthlingborough Nursery and Infant School Issue 3 October 2020

Read, read, read!



We are really focusing on reading with our children. Phonic knowledge is key to supporting children to learn to read. We have daily phonics lessons across the school to focus on learning the phonic code for reading. When children first start developing reading skills we ensure that the books they read are not too challenging but match the sounds they know so they can access reading straight away. Many of our Reception children will start with books without or with very few words.



As the children develop their phonetic awareness and can access more words this will be reflected in their home reader. At the moment, we are not sending out or changing the books as often as before due to the focus matching of text to child and also due to our pandemic risk assessment. We are looking at safe ways to send home more books, including using Reading Eggs, an online reading and phonics programme.

Behaviour

We have high expectations of behaviour at INIS and to ensure our children quickly pick up our rules we explain them simply. We use a simple 1,2,3 peg system to help children understand the rules but also to make amends when things go wrong. We use restorative conversations with the children, which work around four key questions.

What happened? How are you feeling? How are others feeling? What do you need to do to make things better?

A child will move a peg to level 1 for minor incidents as a reminder, for example it could be for calling out or not getting on with a task. The child at this point has an opportunity to bring their behaviour back in line. If they are unable to do this they will move to stage 2 where again they have the opportunity to improve their behaviour, but if they are unable to do so they move to stage 3. There will be a consequence at this level which may be missing a break time or seeing a senior member of staff. Teachers will not inform parents of small rules breaks which are quickly resolved. Parents will be informed if there are any ongoing behaviour issues and we will work with parents to improve this. We do not tolerate bullying and this may move straight to level three and parents will be involved. The behaviour policy is in our information section on website, you can follow the links below.

Pupil Premium

You will have seen the recent letter regarding Pupil Premium. I would like to urge parents who think they may be eligible to apply. We know during the pandemic many family's circumstances changed even for just a while. If you have claimed one of the benefits listed recently or are doing now it is worth checking to see if you are eligible.

If you need any support with this, please contact the school office, we will be happy to help.



If you are receiving any one of the awards listed below then you are eligible for the pupil premium grant:

- Income Support Income based Job Seekers Allowance Income related Employment and Support Allowance Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to working the credit and here an entrol or the Immigration and an entrol them.
- tax credit and have an annual gross income of nomore than £16,190) Universal Credit

There is no stigma or difference for your child in class other than they will be supported more for their individual needs. There will be a £100 voucher parents can use. The Pupil premium lasts for six years even if your work situation changes. Please claim for what you are entitled to. It can support you and your family. If we go into lockdown again it may even help to support with weekly food shopping. Families were able to receive £15 per registered child to help with shopping which came directly to your email as a simple voucher.

The voucher can be used to pay for:

- Trips and visits Payment for clubs
- Uniform such as a new sweatshirts/cardioans or PE T-shirts .
- (£30 maximum).
- Books from the school book fair (maximum £20).
- School milk (if your child is over 5 years of age). School photographs (maximum E20)
- Snack

What can I use the voucher for?

We have the school photographer in this week so this is an ideal opportunity to check your eligibility and then maybe use some of the voucher to pay photographers if that is what you would like to do. We will be bringing clubs and trips back when it is safe to do so too and we are looking to do a virtual school book fair soon.



YEAR ONE A GREAT START!




Year One have been very busy with their learning. They have been active in our nature area. Learning lots about numbers and doing some fantastic writing! They have all read to their teachers tool

Flu Vaccine

Our children will have the opportunity to have the flu nasal vaccine on **Tuesday 1st December** in school. Please ensure you fill in the consent form which has been emailed out to all parents with children in Reception, Year one and Year two. I am satisfield that a full risk assessment is in place from the NHS and the nurses administrating the vaccine.

This poster emphasises why it is important to get the flu vaccine and this link

<u>https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/vaccinations/child-flu-vaccine/</u>. The nasal spray flu vaccine can cause a mild fever which should respond to paracetamol. Giving the child a flu vaccine means that the family is less likely to get flu so less likely to need testing and self-isolation. Therefore, the key thing is that a temperature following the vaccine will respond to paracetamol, whereas Covid won't.
